Protect and renew is the theme for January. It is the best time of year to cast a critical eye over your garden and determine areas that need assistance to cope with the summer conditions. It is also an ideal time to set your gardening resolutions in celebration of the New Year!

## JANUARY BIRTH FLOWERS



### CARNATION

Available in a range of colours and patterns, carnation is the perfect flower to celebrate all those born in January.

Carnations can be grown in an assortment of areas, including pots, so long as the soil is well drained and enriched with **Seamungus** prior to planting.

Once established, feed with **Sudden Impact for Roses** pellets or Advanced Biological Formula every eight weeks.



### HIBBERTIA

Hibbertia is a genus of Australian native flowering shrubs and groundcovers.

Hibbertia will settle in well is **Seamungus** is incorporated throughout the soil when planting. There are many varieties to choose from, and they will reward you with a great floral display.

Choose a sunny, well-draining position and once established, fertilise with **Bush Tucker** pellets or Advanced Biological Formula.

# JANUARY FERTILISING GUIDE



## Year round fertilising for year round health

Like humans and animals, plants require regular feeding throughout the year – at least once in each season.

Happy, healthy, well nourished plants are more resistant to pests, diseases, heat stress and frost.



### ALL PLANTING

Neutrog's planting 'trifecta' is ideal for all planting situations, particularly this time of year.

Incorporate **Seamungus** into the soil prior to planting, and water in well with **GOGO Juice**. Once the plants are in, mulch with **Whoflungdung** to retain moisture and protect the soil and roots from the summer sun.



### WATER

Keep your plants hydrated throughout summer. You are better off watering your garden less often and for longer to give the soil and roots a good soak.

Consider an application of **GOGO Juice** to increase your gardens resilience against heat stress and diseases.







## ROSES

Feed your roses towards the end of January with **Sudden Impact for Roses** pellets or Advanced Biological Formula in preparation for their autumn flush of flowers.



## LAWN

Follow the same watering principle for your lawn as well – water less often and for longer to ensure the water goes well beneath the canopy.

An application of **Sudden Impact for Lawns Advanced Biological Formula** will produce a quick, green result, or **Seamungus Lawn** for full protection throughout January.



## INDOOR PLANTS

Don't let your indoor plants dry out this summer!

## FERNS

## MULCHING

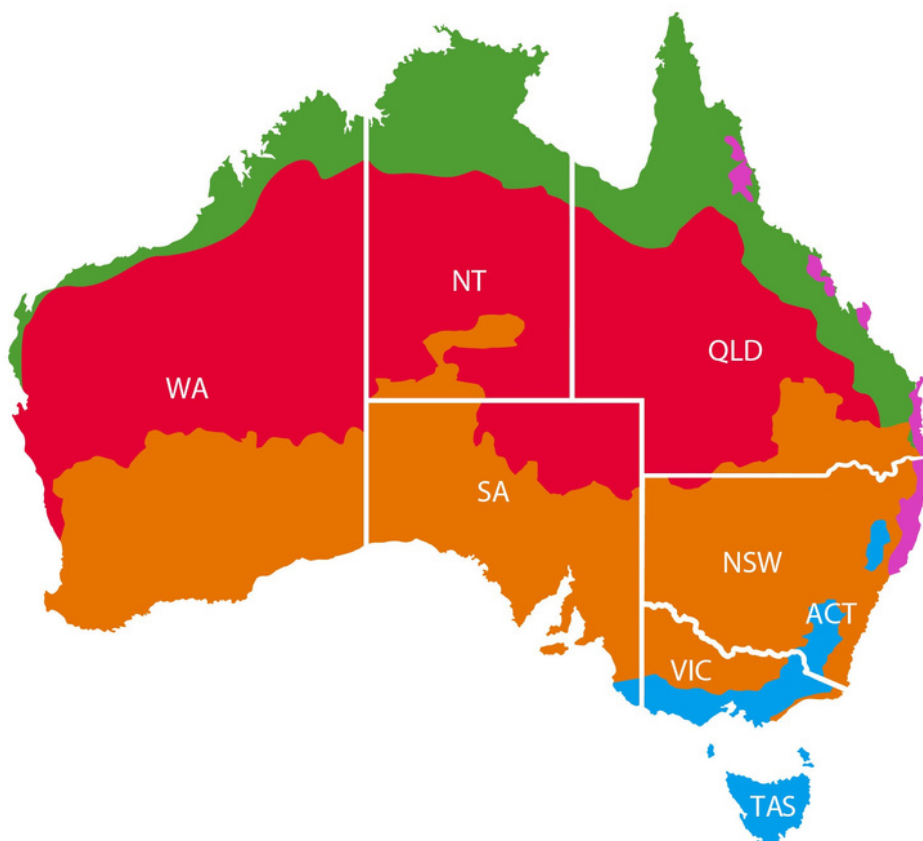
